3. The President suffers a stroke and is unable to communicate.		
4. The Vice President dies while in office.		
5. Both the President and Vice President are killed in a plane crash.		
6. The President is unhappy with the Vice President's public statements opposing official policies and wants to dismiss her from office.		
7. The President dies and the Vice President is sworn in as President, but needs emergency surgery before a new Vice President is chosen. She will be unable to make decisions for about 12 hours.		
8. After recovering from an injury, the President believes he is ready to resume his duties, but the Vice President and Cabinet members disagree.
